HOMELESS ANIMALS ARE IN BIG TROUBLE RIGHT NOW and the problem isn't just local – it's country-wide. In our entire history, we have never seen so many dogs and puppies being taken to shelters. It is primarily because people refuse to spay/neuter their dogs and had an "accidental" litter. Many times, it isn't the first litter either – they are repeat offenders who continually take unwanted litters to shelters and they often blame their dogs for getting pregnant. Many rescues will pay to have the dogs spayed and even that doesn't convince them that it is time to spay their dogs.

We can't keep up – the need is too great. We get pleas for anywhere from 50-100 puppies or dogs who need rescue every single day. Like every other rescue in the country, we are limited by the number of foster parents we have. The most precious commodity that a rescue has is their foster parents (with monetary donations being a close second).

We have a wonderful and dedicated group of foster parents, but we need more. We always need more; there is no such thing as too many foster parents.

Fostering is a great experience for families. Not only does it give parents the chance to teach their children about compassion, but it is an experience that the whole family can share. Even young children can participate by performing simple tasks such as filling up a water bowl or just providing love and attention (under parental supervision of course).

Are you looking for a new furry family member? We have many wonderful dogs waiting for forever homes. Once you've fallen in love, the next step is to fill out an adoption application to get the ball rolling.

Go to www.aforeverhome.org to see our available pets.

Fostering is a great experience for single people. If you have a foster dog at home, you'll never be alone. Your foster dog will be happy to see you every time you walk through the door. Dogs are also a great way to meet new friends because dogs bring people together. Walking your foster dog in a public place (wearing an "adopt me" vest) often leads to conversations with strangers (strangers who may turn into friends, adopters, or foster parents). At the very least, you will make friends with our other foster parents and volunteers.

Fostering is a great experience for senior citizens. Sometimes senior citizens may retreat from being out in public – perhaps due to losing a partner. Fostering is an opportunity to get back out in public and interact with people while saving a life.

Most of our fosters go the extra mile by posting their foster dogs on their social media platforms and sharing their information with friends and family. Many dogs have found their forever homes this way.

We're often asked how much of a time commitment is involved in fostering. That is completely up to you. Fosters bring their foster dogs to our adoption events on Saturdays between NOON-3PM – that's just three hours per week. We do understand that everyone is busy so if a foster has to miss an occasional event, we're ok with that.

The duration of a foster commitment will vary. There are many different ways to foster.

PUPPIES. Puppies are usually adopted fairly quickly.

ADULT DOGS. Adult dogs can often find forever homes within a few weeks.

PREGNANT DOGS. Fostering a pregnant dog saves multiple dogs – the mom and her unborn babies. This is a commitment of anywhere from two-five months depending on how pregnant mom is when she arrives.

HEARTWORM POSITIVE DOGS. This is usually a commitment of three-four months. Heartworm positive dogs are easy to foster because they must be crated during certain stages of their treatment. They also cannot attend adoption events during treatment.

SENIOR DOGS. There is nothing more satisfying than caring for an old dog who someone has discarded. They often land in shelters after having been with their person for their entire lives. They are sad and confused as to why they have been abandoned.

They are usually fairly low maintenance because they don't require a lot of exercise and are happy just to be fed and loved. Senior dogs are usually with us the longest because most people want to adopt younger dogs. Senior dogs make great foster dogs for senior citizens too!

So what are **AFH**'s responsibilities and what are yours? That's easy. We pay for everything – vet bills, food, and supplies (crates, leashes, collars, bowls, etc.). You take care of our dogs like they're your own. You feed them, walk them, love them, and teach them basic commands like sit and stay. You bring them to adoption events. It really is that simple and when you foster, you not only save your foster dog – you also open up a spot in a shelter for another homeless dog. It's a win-win.

We will match you with a dog (or puppies) who matches your lifestyle. Are you an avid runner? We can pair you with a dog who wants/needs/loves lots of exercise. Is your style more laid back? We can match you with a calmer dog. Do you have the desire to save a special needs dog (blind, deaf, etc.)? We can find you one. Do you love love puppies? No problem there – shelters are overflowing with puppies.

The need has never been greater. There are thousands of dogs sitting in shelters right now. Their fates are uncertain and without you, many will not make it out of the shelter. **Their lives literally depend on you.** •

A RESCUE STORY WITH A HAPPY ENDING

As you know, shelters are overflowing and begging for help. As you read earlier in this newsletter, due to a lack of fosters, we have to say no to most of their requests for help. Axcela's story is one that we just couldn't say no to.

On Thursday, January 18, 2024 we became aware of a shelter in Oklahoma City that was desperately seeking rescue for a dog and her seven babies. Axcela, an Australian Cattle Dog and her babies were all scheduled to be euthanized the next day at 9:00AM. We had approximately 14 hours to do something about it.

How they ended up there didn't matter – the point is that they were all going to lose their lives because humans had failed them.

Within literally two hours, **AFH** reached out to the shelter to commit to saving them. The next day, January 19, two volunteers flew to Oklahoma City and on Saturday, January 20, they loaded up mom and babies (and a dog named Magnus who was also scheduled to lose his life) into a rental vehicle and began the 19-hour drive back to northern Virginia.


While they were at the shelter, our volunteers got a hard look at what happens in shelters constantly. Their first experience was with a person who showed up at the shelter to surrender three puppies. The shelter is currently caring for 1,100 animals (that is not a typo) and has not accepted any owner surrenders in over a year due to overcrowding (just take a minute and really think about that). The person left but not before trying to give the puppies to our volunteers. They eventually did leave but obviously there is no way to know what happened to the puppies. They could have been abandoned somewhere – or worse.

Their second experience was with two men who pulled up outside the shelter and dumped out two young dogs – one with a serious leg injury. One of our volunteers yelled "you can't do that" and the men drove off – with the two dogs chasing behind them. Our volunteers went back into the shelter to tell them what happened. We are unfortunately not aware of the outcome, although it is likely that the shelter did come out to take them in.

These are just two examples of things that happen every single day at animal shelters across the country. Axcela and her babies and Magnus were lucky – thousands of other dogs are not. **This is why we need you to foster.** •

I am so glad I followed my heart. My dear friend and neighbor travelled from Virginia to Oklahoma to pick up a mom and seven puppies. I thought she was crazy – but in looking at her Facebook page, I saw a video of this adorable two year old heeler and for some reason I couldn't get him out of my head. I then reached out to **AFH**, who made arrangements to have him transported along with the mom and babies they were saving.

After his long ride, I went to pick him up at my friend's house. He got out of the car wagging his tail and came up to me with lots of kisses. Clearly he was grateful! We took a little time getting to know each other – we went shopping at PetSmart and got some toys and treats and he was such a gentleman! We spent the afternoon playing in the snow and getting to know my other dogs (we are still working on that – but so far it seems to be working).

We then spent the evening at a dog friendly restaurant/pub and what a hit he was! He was the perfect dog, gentle and grateful. He sat for treats – and then took a long nap under the table. No one could believe that a dog this good was just thrown away.

I am so blessed to be able to offer a foster home for this dog (although as my friend says—I'm a foster failure!) I may be in fact be a foster failure if Magnus continues to blend in with my other dogs!

I wish more people would open their hearts and homes to give these loving animals a second chance in life. They deserve it and I believe they know that they are being rescued!

I want to challenge each of my friends out there who are dog lovers and who can open up their homes to at least foster one of these beautiful creatures. They need us!

Thank you Carmen and **A Forever Home**. You are an amazing group of people – the world needs more people like you. Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to make a difference – I absolutely made the right decision.

CODY'S BOOK



Marilyn, the author, writes:

I connected with Cody, the Shepherd on the cover, as Velcro connects. You know I wrote the book, but it's as if he ran the house full of foster dogs. I fostered for 20 years. Cody tells many situations that he "took care of" and helped me through. It is written for adults to read to children who are interested in animals and caring for animals, and perhaps the family who has considered fostering a dog. It starts out simply – talking about saving dogs who are homeless, hungry, and cold. It gets more adult in situations as puppies are returned to the foster because life happened to the family. It's about Cody distressed over a hound that had run loose for four years, ended up in our house after a 19 hour transport ride, and was so scared that Cody thinks he's adopted a broken dog. I show Cody how to put those pieces back together. It's about foster dogs who never move to adoption...they need sanctuary and they never know they didn't get adopted.

Editor's Note: A long-time AFH foster mom adopted a deaf puppy from us. The puppy needed emergency surgery and other AFH volunteers rallied to help. AFH truly is a family.



Words cannot adequately capture the depth of gratitude that I have for the people I volunteer alongside in this organization, but I will make my best attempt...

Early morning on October 10th of this past year, I found out my sweet pup Axl needed emergency surgery for a bowel obstruction. There was never a question that he would get the surgery he needed, but the cost was overwhelming for my family. As soon as I got in the car after dropping him off at the veterinary hospital, I called **AFH** volunteer Annette Anderson just to cry. I was so scared. Axl is the kindest boy – an **AFH** foster fail, deaf, fluent in ASL, and an amazing little brother who leads with his heart.
