

#### Volunteering that Fits – Freedom Rides and Care Team Help


I have really enjoyed volunteering for A Forever Home.




### LAINEY

# WHAT DOES IT TAKE TO FOSTER?

*It's easy!* You take care of our dogs like they're your own. You feed them, walk them, love them, and teach them basic commands like sit and stay. You bring them to adoption events once a week (3 hours) or work with our Care Team for support. We pay for everything – vet bills, food, and supplies (crates, leashes, collars, bowls, etc.). When you foster, you not only save your foster dog – you also open up a spot in a shelter for another homeless dog. It's a win-win.

From the day I adopted him, Stevie was my companion, my clown, and my sidekick. Stevie was a pleasure to have and was well-known in the neighborhood for his adventurous ways. 

# Join the AFH Care Team

The Care Team consists of volunteers who are available to help fosters – usually by caring for a foster's dog or puppies for a day if the foster is gone (in the foster's home), giving a dog a ride, walking a dog, etc.

The Care Team is not set up for temp fostering and members do not have to be approved fosters. The care and support provided are meant to meet only short-term needs – from a one-time occurrence to recurring weekly support for a limited time.

Rescued - A Happy Tale



Damon, a Great Dane mix, came to AFH 20 pounds underweight and left happily with a loving forever family.

Damon arrived from transport covered with pressure sores on his back, ears, and legs. His bones were sticking out and he had chewed his tail so badly, it was raw and bleeding to the extent that we feared he might lose it.

The vet had a difficult time estimating his age because he was so small due to a lack of nutrition. He estimated Damon was around 2-3 years old. He weighed only 47.5 pounds.

Damon was scared when he first arrived. He was hesitant to go outside because he had been left out there for too long. Incredibly, the neglect he suffered was not reflected in his demeanor. When he arrived at AFH, he was affectionate and gave everyone kisses. He was bubbly and sweet and acted like an excited puppy. With the help of his foster – and his foster brother Cooper – Damon began to heal. Within days, he was playing tug-of-war with Cooper. He gained weight, his health improved, and he kept his tail!

Damon was adopted into his forever family just four months after arriving at AFH. His rescue and rehabilitation required a significant amount of financial resources, time, and loving care. Without the help and support of our volunteers and donors, Damon wouldn't have had this chance for a new, happy tale in his forever home.
