
### **LUCIE**

## **VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT**

AFH has so many wonderful volunteers. Read on for a Q&A with our awesome volunteer, Kelly Byrd.

Q: How did you get involved with AFH?

A: We previously adopted two wonderful lab puppies around 2004 and started fostering for AFH in 2008. My boys and I fostered over 80 puppies and young adult dogs between 2008 and 2012.

**Q:** What other volunteering have you done with AFH?

A: In 2012, I switched from being a foster to doing homechecks and interviews to ensure the pups are going to great homes. Prior to COVID we would drive to the potential adopters homes and meet in person to see the space and even offer suggestions to help with the dog's training and transition. Now we are able to complete all interviews faster by doing them virtually.

Q: Do you love it?

A: Volunteering is very rewarding. It's o nice meeting potential adopters since I was one previously. As a foster, you are their caretaker while they wait for their forever home. You love them like they are your own.

Q: Any advice for potential volunteers?

A: I encourage everyone to be a part of the AFH journey, whether it's collecting donations, contributing, fostering, transporting, volunteering at the adoption events or doing homechecks. Every bit helps so it doesn't matter what you do. Everyone working together helps the dogs!



## HELPING YOUR NEW DOG ADJUST

Adopting a dog is a big decision and an exciting time. You may want to show them off, take them out, get them spruced up. But here's the thing: your new family member has just been through a lot including leaving a foster home or shelter. They don't know your rules, your routine, or whether you're the kind of person who shares snacks. And that's okay.

Those first hours, days, and even weeks together? Think of them like the start of any brand-new relationship—exciting, a little awkward, and full of "getting to know you" moments. No dog should be judged by their day-one behavior. Adjustment takes time, patience, and a sprinkle of strategy.

Here are some helpful "settling-in" tips—collected from our own experience at A Forever Home and some of the best trainers we know:

### I. Follow the "Rule of 3"

Dog pros swear by the 3-3-3 Rule:

- 3 Days to decompress (translation: they might be overwhelmed, quiet, or acting a little weird).
- 3 Weeks to start learning the ropes.
- 3 Months to feel like, "Yep, I live here now."

Go slow, give grace, and remember—they're still unpacking their emotional suitcase.

### 2. Keep Things Calm, Predictable and Don't Rush Introductions

Skip the grooming, crowds, dog park tour, and cross-country road trip. Short walks, quiet hangouts, and a feeding schedule are the magic formula for now. And, there's no need to meet the "entire fan club" right away. One person or pet at a time, please.

### 3. Give Them Space

First, they need THEIR space. Crates give a dog their own "den" and help with training. We know. You want snuggles! But let them come to you. Relationships built on trust last a lifetime (and involve fewer side-eyes).

### 4. Make Alone Time a Positive Thing

One day, you'll have to leave them home. Start small—literally walk out the door for a couple minutes, then come back like it's no big deal. Leave behind a stuffed Kong, puzzle toy, or their favorite chew to make it a treat, not a tragedy.

### 5. Reward the Good Stuff

Treats, praise, play—positive reinforcement is your best friend. Skip the scolding. It breaks trust and slows progress.

### 6. Be Patient With Potty Training

Even seasoned pros can forget their manners in a new home. Take them out often, cheer like crazy when they go outside, and clean up accidents without a fuss.

#### The Bottom Line:

The first few weeks are an adjustment period for you and your pup. Expect a few hiccups, keep your expectations realistic, and celebrate every little win. You didn't just adopt a dog—you started a new relationship. And with time, consistency, and love, it just might be the best one of your life.




### **ORG** in Action Features A Forever Home
