FOSTER TO FOREVER

Fostering Sets Dogs Up for Adoption Success

Every dog's rescue story begins with uncertainty, but for many, the path to a happy ending runs through a loving foster home. Fostering isn't just a temporary stop — it's a powerful transformation that benefits both the dog and the future adopter.

Why Fostering Matters

When a dog is pulled from a shelter, they often arrive scared, unsure, and sometimes in poor health. A foster home provides a safe, stable environment where they can decompress, learn routines, and rediscover the joy of being a dog. Foster families offer patience, structure, and love — the first steps toward healing both emotionally and physically.

The Dog's Transformation

In foster care, dogs get to:

- Build Confidence: Shy or anxious dogs learn to trust people and adapt to new surroundings.
- Learn the Ropes: House training, basic commands, and good manners are introduced and reinforced.
- Receive Socialization: Exposure to other pets, people, and everyday life prepares them for adoption.
- Get Needed Care: Medical needs are addressed, from vaccinations to surgeries, so adopters take home a healthy pet.
- Behavior & Temperament Insights: Fosters observe dogs in a home environment, providing valuable details about energy level, personality, and compatibility with children or other pets.

Peace of Mind for Adopters

Adopting a dog that's been fostered comes with fewer unknowns. Foster families can share exactly how the dog behaves in a home, how they respond to training, and what type of household would be the best fit. This means adopters can choose a pet whose needs and personality align with their lifestyle, reducing the risk of mismatches — a common reason dogs are returned to rescues.

A Win-Win for Everyone

Fostering sets dogs up for success and gives adopters confidence in their decision. It shortens the adjustment period, reduces surprises, and increases the likelihood of a lifelong match.

When you see "fostered" in a dog's adoption profile, know that it's more than a word — it's a promise that this dog has already taken big steps toward becoming the perfect companion.


BRILLIANT BLACKEY

RESCUE STORY

Cherry's Journey: From Suffering to Safety



Cherry was discovered by one of our rescue partners, lying motionless, clearly in unbearable pain. This little 17-pound dog had blood on her head and could barely move. At first, they believed she had been hit by a car. X-rays confirmed a broken pelvis, but also revealed more: she had an older leg injury from a previous car accident, and the wounds on her head weren't from the road. Cherry had been shot in the head with birdshot.

She Deserved So Much More

We weren't sure what to expect when she arrived. But Cherry's resilience, her will to survive, reminds us why we continue this work.

Cherry's foster family was immediately smitten. Despite everything she had

endured in her short life, Cherry remained unbelievably sweet and sassy. Besides being a silly sock thief, she is gentle, affectionate, and trusting—traits that are all the more remarkable considering how humans had failed her time and time again.

Cherry was worth every effort. And we are so thrilled that she's found her forever family who will love her endlessly and never let her down again.

Cherry is just one example highlighting the urgent and ongoing support needed to provide care including surgery, pain management, rehabilitation, and long-term support for both physical and emotional recovery.

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT: MARY MONIE

I've loved dogs since I can remember and have had at least 2 (often 4) since I became an adult. My list of dogs we've loved and lost is more than can fit on the application. They are my best friends and a constant source of love for my family. I find the joy of loving a pet to be very rewarding and can't imagine a life without them! I adopted my first rescue in 2017 and began volunteering right afterwards. I was so impressed by the entire organization that I called immediately to find out how I could help. Our second rescue came to us in 2020 after she was returned to AFH.

I began (pre-Covid) doing in-person home visit/inspections but all of that changed once we had to do them all virtually. Now it's so easy to get done via virtual chat. It's a quick email to the potential adopter to schedule the visit and a 25-35 minute video call which includes the interview and tour of the home. I look for anything that stands out as dangerous, talk through how to care for a new pet, answer questions, and go over our expectations of care/rules/contract items. It's fun for me to get to know the adopters and their families during this process. Many send me pics of themselves with their new babies on adoption day and those make my whole week!

TIPS FOR THE HOLIDAYS

Happy Howl-idays! Keeping Things Calm for You and Your Pup

Between the visitors, the noise, and the irresistible smells coming from the kitchen, it's easy for your furry friend to feel a bit frazzled. Here are a few easy ways to keep things chill and safe for everyone this season.

Give Them a Chill Zone:

Even social butterflies need downtime. Set up a quiet space—maybe a bedroom or cozy corner—with their bed, toys, and water. It's the perfect escape when things get too loud or crowded.
